Transportation... A Vital Link in Missions

Wherever mission workers need to reach people where the live, transportation is essential. Most forms of motor transportation are impractical in remote areas because repairs and spare parts are difficult and expensive to obtain. The MUV was designed by Earl Miner a missionary who was aware of the need for a simple, easy-to-maintain, economical vehicle. The MUV costs less than an automobile or truck, even including the shipping costs. It will go farther on a gallon of gasoline than most vehicles and easily hauls a half-ton load. Parts are readily available in most countries of the world for its simple, one-cylinder engine.



The MUV is also available with a diesel engine for places where diesel fuel is more readily available than gasoline.

Many MUV vehicles are sponsored by donations from church and other charitable organizations and individuals. Mission Utility Vehicles, Inc. accepts requests for MUVs from workers of all denominations. Determination to ship a vehicle to a particular project is dependent upon availability, and contingent upon proper arrangements for importation into the country in accordance with local laws.

The basic MUV costs \$3600. The other models vary in cost



depending on the model and the engine required. Shipping costs also vary, from \$500.00 to \$2000 depending on destination and mode of transportation.

The MUV comes in several designs. The basic MUV comes with an industrial commercial 8hp Briggs & Stratton gas engine. The body style is for hauling up to a half ton load and is equipped with two tool boxes built in. We also have a model with seats that can easily carry four people plus driver or can be equipped with a ramp for wheelchairs or to carry stretchers. We also now have available a diesel engine for areas where diesel fuel is more readily available than gasoline. We also have a 2000 watt belt-driven generator and a belt-driven 22gpm water pump that is adapted to provide electricity or pump water using the MUV engine as a portable power plant.



Help Provide a MUV for a Missionary

Many MUVs are provided free to mission personnel through the donation of local churches, church classes, individuals and organizations or are acquired by mission organizations to supply their own missionaries. We have a long waiting list of requests for these sturdy, reliable machines from missionaries and church organizations in the United States and in many countries



around the world. Mission Utility Vehicles, Inc. will be happy to provide a 12 minute video presentation to help explain what a MUV is and what a MUV does.

The line of Mission Utility Vehicles has expanded to include the MUV-4. This four-wheel model has an articulated frame that keeps all four wheels on the ground when crossing rough terrain. The MUV-4 offers rear-wheel drive, a dump bed, two forward speeds and reverse, two rear tool boxes and a storage box up front. Although the MUV-4 offers many new features it uses the same simple engine and drive train that make all MUV vehicles so well-suited for their mission. What Can Simple, Basic Transportation Do?

A MUV is carrying building materials in Zaire to construct housing for the homeless. Another is carrying food and medical supplies to a remote area of Honduras. Latin American Communication Development Ministries (LATCOM) has several MUVs at their mission field in Zapaco, Bolivia helping the Ayore Indians in their daily lives. Several other MUVs are helping in the construction of homes for the Rainbow Network in Nicaragua. Two MUVs are at work in Malawi, South Africa, courtesy of the Presbyterian Churches of Tulsa, Oklahoma. Another missionary in Bolivia uses his MUV to haul construction materials for a new church building.

In the United States MUVs are equipped to transport the physically challenged. The Grace Brethren

Foreign Missions uses a diesel MUV to transport patients to and from hospitals in Chad, Africa. Mission Utility Vehicles are helping

people all over the world, in Haiti, Suriname, Bolivia, Chad, Honduras, the Philippines, Guatemala, Kenya, Zaire, Papua New Guinea, Malawi, and even here in the United States, to provide them with transportation to be able to help themselves and to help others.
